Mori Family International's fruitful 2016 summer event in Aguas Blancas

Despite the constant rain and with the Rodadero Peak in the background, around a hundred descendants of the Patriarch Ignacio Mori, their significant others and friends gathered to share the joy, the music, the memories, and plentiful food that included bacalaitos (codfish fritters), sorullitos (corn fritters), pastelillitos (beef turnovers), Puerto Rican fried chicken and pork, ñame or yam (not sweet potato), mollejitas en escabeche (pickled gizzards), chicken filled plantain baskets, sancocho (stew) with white rice, arroz con gandules y carne de cerdo (rice with green pigeon peas and pork), fruit, beverages, desserts, etc. All this, besides the dancing that took place under an improvised awning due to the rain. Visit of Moris of Puerto Rico to Moris of Hawaii

When Serafín Mori, son of the Patriarch Ignacio Mori, migrated to Hawaii with his family in the year 1901, he couldn't imagine that eventually a bond will be formed between two lines of the same family separated by thousands of kilometers on two different oceans, the Pacific and the Atlantic. Almost from the onset of Family Mori International, the Hawaiian Moris (known as Morris) and the P.R. Moris had maintained a relationship that has included several visits by each party.

On this summer of 2016, Marta Eva Mori Galarza, her husband Choro Salinas, Nancy Pacheco Mori, along with William Irizarry Mori and his wife Lucy González embarked on a long trip to Hawaii were they shared with the Hawaiian relatives and enjoyed the beauty of the islands for 10 days. Furthermore, Eva and Choro took the opportunity to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary alongside Melvin Morris and wife, who were also celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary.

The historic corner – Biographical Information of the Patriarch Ignacio Francisco Mori Romani (1828-1894) - 2*

4. When did Ignacio Mori arrive in Puerto Rico? Ignacio, his wife and her daughter, Marinés arrived in Puerto Rico in 1854. They settled in town of Mayaguez. Ignacio and his wife also operated an inn there. He was the business manager. Marinés was very young but helped in running the inn.

At this time, Mayaguez was the second most important port in Puerto Rico, being San Juan, the capital of Puerto Rico, the most important one. Coffee was exported from both ports to Cuba, United States, Europe and the Vatican in Rome. It is believed that Pope León III's (1872 -1903) sip of coffee (*trago de café*) was from coffee imported from Hacienda Salvación "Plantation of Coffee" farm in Río Prieto, Yauco. We would like to think that would be coffee produced at "Llano de Mori."

- **5.** When was Ignacio Mori´s first child born in Puerto Rico? The first child, a boy, was born in Mayaguez, Puerto Rico in 1856. María Ines Mori, Ignacio´s granddaughter told us: "My grandfather´s first child was Eusebio Mori Romani. He was my uncle." This boy was his only son with Petrona. Eusebio was the first Mori descendant in Puerto Rico. Some of Eusebio descendant are here today with us. Shortly after giving birth, Petrona died and Ignacio, who was only 28 years old, became a widower with one son.
- **6. For how long did Patriarch Ignacio Mori live in Mayaguez, P. R.** Ignacio Mori lived in Mayaguez between 1854 and 1862. His granddaughter told us: "While living in Mayaguez, Ignacio and Marinés fell in love. She was my grandmother. Out of this marriage, two boys were born. One was my father, named José Maria Mori Romani. The second was Uncle Ramón Mori Romani. Shortly after the last boy was born, Marinés also passed away." "I never knew my grandmother", she said. So, Ignacio became a widower again but this time, he had three sons. Petrona and Marinés never lived in Yauco. They both passed away in Mayaguez. After some time, Ignacio and his three children left Mayaguez and went to Yauco.
